# COURSE DESCRIPTION (HIST 164)

The 2020 protests about monuments in Philadelphia and across the nation have exposed this truth: **Arguments over the past are arguments about the future**. This place-based course examines local and national public memory in relation to the built environment. Students will learn about the making of the U.S. memorial landscape in the long nineteenth century, its remaking in the twentieth century, and its possible futures in the (un)making. Initial presentations and readings will cover a variety of commemorative structures and practices, from the permanent and the material to the ephemeral and the virtual. The instructor will provide international, national, and local context, including an overview of Philadelphia history. But the heart of the course will be projects based on deep engagement with local sources. Students will analyze memorial landscapes, past and present, of Greater Philadelphia, of West Philly, and of Penn's campus. Your final assignment will be a proposal—or an actual staging—of a "memory work" of your own design. The overall goal of the course is to join the academic and the civic, town and gown.

This course is affiliated with the Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF) Paideia Program, which serves as a hub for civic dialogue in undergraduate education at Penn. SNF Paideia courses offer a robust, interdisciplinary civic education that highlights the role that civil discourse, dialogue across difference, and wellness play in cultivating integrated citizenship within the Penn Community. ### MAJOR PROJECTS (3)

- 1. A historical analysis of one or more *intentional* monument(s) in the current or past landscape of memory in Philadelphia, West Philly, or Penn.
  - —For example, you could choose one particular statue outside City Hall; or, you could choose *all* of the statuary outside City Hall as a group; or, all the *equestrian* statues in Philadelphia, including the two (George McClellan and John Fulton Reynolds) on the north side of City Hall; or, all the statues *depicting Black people* in Philadelphia, including the one (Octavius Catto) on the south side of City Hall; etc.
- 2. A historical and sociological analysis of
  - —unintentional monument(s), or
  - —un(der)protected landmark(s), or
  - —erased feature(s), or
  - —absent feature(s)

in the current landscape of memory in Philadelphia, West Philly, or Penn.

- 3. One of the following for Philadelphia, West Philly, or Penn:
  - —A proposal for a new "memory work" for something un(der)commemorated
  - —A proposal for the reimagining of an existing monument
  - —The actual (recorded) staging of an ad hoc, temporary, in-situ memory work—pop-up installation, performance art, et cetera.

### Important notes:

- At least one (but no more than two) of your projects must relate to Penn's campus.
- Students cannot get a passing grade without completing all three projects.
- All projects must be appropriate (in terms of quality, content, and format) for uploading to a <u>upenn.edu</u> website viewable to the public starting January 2022.
- Projects of exceptional quality (all of them, I hope!) will be nominated by the professor for formal publication (in adapted or summarized form) in the Monument Lab *Bulletin*: <a href="https://monumentlab.com/bulletin">https://monumentlab.com/bulletin</a>. That would be a great thing to have on your CV!

All three projects can take <u>any</u> of the five following digital forms:

- A) Text with illustrations and notes and full bibliography (akin to a research paper)
- B) Infographic or data visualization

- C) Multi-media digital story
- D) Short video/film
- E) Podcast

If you choose B–E, you must provide an accompanying "catalog essay" of publishable quality with notes and a bibliography.

There is an extensive archive of primary and secondary sources on Philadelphia history available to you through Box, in a folder I will share with you. The collection is called "Philamonuments." The high-quality material therein was assembled by Dr. Tim Holliday (a recent graduate of Penn's Ph.D. program in History), and Molly Leech (a current doctoral student in History), and me. Because much of the tedious research has been done for you, I expect great projects. I expect professional-level work.

An additional bibliographic guide to doing place-based Philadelphia history is located at the end of this syllabus.

# TIPS FOR ADVANCED GOOGLE SEARCHING

- —Remember that word order matters!
- —Don't worry so much about word endings (e.g., start vs. starts/started/starting)
- —Search Google Books and Google Scholar and Google Images separately
- —Search for exact word(s)/name(s) with quotation marks = "Henry Howard Houston"
- —Use the most distinctive possible search words
- —Exclude a word from a search with minus sign (hyphen) = fossil fuel -coal
- —Restrict search by site = site:https://archives.upenn.edu/
- —Restrict search by type = filetype:pdf or ext:pdf
- —Use Advanced Search page = https://www.google.com/advanced\_search
- —Don't give up after the first, or the tenth, failed search!
